EDITORIAL

VALUES We will have to rethink our values, here in Australia; in Tasmania we are lucky not to be quite so crowded. Where re-thinking is necessary is : WHAT are our values ? Is it profit and loss ? Money ? machines to do work that people could do? more cars on the roads ? More T.V.s ? in fact more of everything, so that if you have a good job you get ulcers trying to get everything paid for, or just trying to keep on the status trail. Or are people more important ? so that its worth while to plan an educational future for our young people. At present they don't have many challenges in living. Are we battling to get a new town started somewhere on the edge of nowhere? where young people could really do some good deeds getting it started. But if people could be trained properly so that they could do the work they were really interested in ; that would bring in a lot more ideas, which would work like a stone thrown into a pool, the ripples go right to the edge. First we would have to give up a lot of ideas about making a profit, and a lot of people would be very upset; and make a fuss, they always do if it looks like being a loss. This is a better idea for young people, if you had to go to a town to be trained for some particular job, you had to live there - four- five years while you learnt it, then you had to leave and go back to your area and carry out that job, this would help with more jobs, and stop the cities getting too big. Men are not machines but living creatures, they need to feel their work is important and will help others; they also need to be able to get away from towns, back to the wilderness to be renewed, as we are still primitive man in lots of ways, and wilderness areas are essential to a balanced man, they can go back and walk, which is a very good way of getting ones nerves back into order, also ones mind. Wind and rain blow away a lot of phantom ills.

Greedy people can't bear to take a smaller percentage off their profits, or perhaps they feel they can't afford to, prices are too high now, these things will be forced on us in the end and come as a horrid shock if we don't think of ways to do things better. We have too many ills to heal even here in this pleasant land, too many homeless, too many poor, too many ill-treated because they are different or another colour, too many neglected children left to themselves.



We certainly have a lot of re-thinking to do.

COMPANION PLANTING (Cont. from last week)

Some plants and herbs are good friends and grow better in each others company, but others are not friendly and won't grow together, so here are some good friends and also who they dislike. Beans planted between rows of potatoes, or carrots, caulis, or cabbage, but not near onions, garlic or gladiolus, runner beans can be planted with corn, they also dislike onions, garlic and shallots. Beets like onions or kohlrabi, they don't like runner-beans or charlock, Brassicas (cabbage family) like herbs, sage, peppermint, rosemary, or beets, onions, celery potatoes, they don't like strawberries, Cabbages planted near tomatoes help with white cabbage butterfly. African marigolds planted around the outside of a garden with twitch is a great help as twitch hates marigolds and dies out, not at once but over a season. Nasturtiums are good companions to radishes, cabbages, under fruit trees and near the pumpkin patch, it deters aphids, squash beetles and bugs and improves growth. Cont. next wk.

COOKING NOTES

Orange and Celery Salad


Carefully section 4 oranges, mix with 1/2 cup chopped clery and marinate in 1/4 cup Fruit Juice French Dressing. Serve on endive or lettuce leaves, adding more dressing if desired. Sprinkle with chopped mint. This salad is very good with Spring lamb.

Fruit Juice French Dressing

Dissolve in 1 tspn water, 1/2 tspn salt and 1 tspn sugar (or Honey) Add 4 tblspn olive oil and 2 tblspn lemon juice (or 1/2 & 1/2 grapefruit juice with lemon or lime) mix.

SAUCE for anything hot or cold.


