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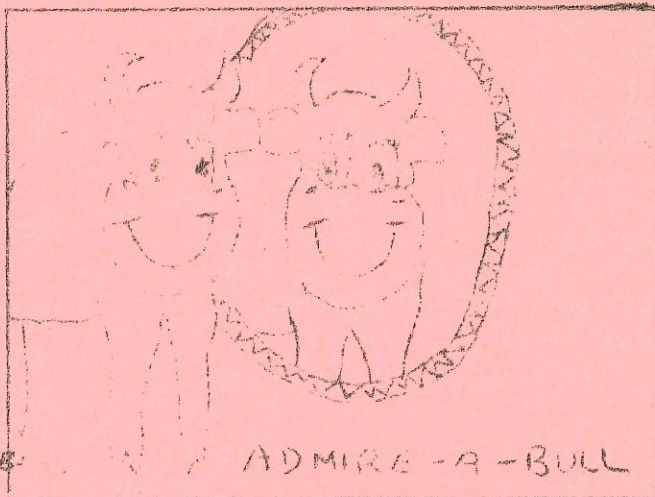
EDITORIAL

PRESS STATEMENT

The Minister for Education, Mr. Neil Batt has told Andrew Lohrey M.H.A. that the Education Department has no plans to upgrade the secondary section of St. Helens school. Mr. Lohrey said it was Educational policy that children finishing primary school at St. Helens should go to the St. Marys District school. Educational opportunities were greater at St. Marys, courses were more varied and standards naturally higher.

Mr. Lohrey said the District School at St. Marys had been built and developed as a school to take secondary pupils from surrounding districts. It was important that the numbers were kept up at St. Marys otherwise standards would drop and all secondary pupils would be affected adversely.

Mr. Lohrey said it was important that parents at St. Helens be aware of departmental policy.

Mr. Lohrey said the Government just does not have the money to build another district High School in the area, particularly when the one at St. Marys is under utilised.

The Premier in his endeavour to reduce the retiring age is making a step in the right direction, but to give real effect to the unemployment problem the age should be dropped to 60 years.

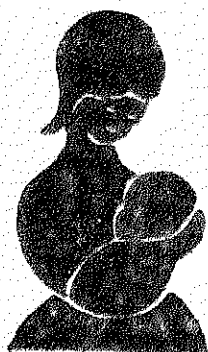
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"BREAST FEEDING - what a beautiful thing to do."

However, until two weeks ago I strongly disagreed with this statement as I suffered the frustration of coping with a new baby with an overwhelming appetite. Despite kindly advice given by relations and friends, things became progressively worse as my milk supply kept diminishing. With this decrease my temper increased. I felt a total failure as a mother. For a long time I have felt that this introduction period between child and mother serves as a vital link for successful future communication. Breast feeding develops the "oneness" as they come to understand and learn about and from each other. For the baby can teach as well as the mother. It displays the pure, sweet love and trust that so many of us unfortunately forget in our adulthood. But such love is transmittable and it is revived in the mother and the true joy of motherhood is then felt and truly expressed. But here I was dreaming of this relationship but unable to obtain it. Then I was told that a branch of N.M.A.A. was now operating in Launceston. A phone call was all that was needed. In a few minutes I had received friendly expert advice and my confidence restored. Within three days I was successfully breast feeding and now I know for sure that the slogan is true.

Despite pressures from the vested interests and their colleagues in Government, uranium mining is a subject which requires strict safeguards and ample PUBLIC debate as recommended by the recently released Fox Report.

We are on the verge of a totally new society - petrol and the car changed society radically in the early part of this century so too will nuclear power. Maybe the change will be for the better but unless certain questions are met how can we confidently proceed. Amongst those questions are what are we to do with the waste?? Plutonium takes many thousands of years to break down from the deadly killer it is - assuming this is to be stored in giant concrete vaults (not dumped in central Australia as some irresponsible litterbug of monstrous proportions has suggested) who will guard it to see it doesn't leak or be stolen? Who will pay them and what sort of a legacy is this to leave for our children's, children's children and infinitum?

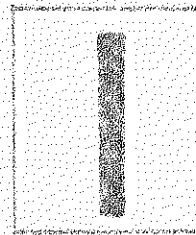
What of the alternatives? - had as much money been poured into solar energy, wind, wave and other alternatives we would probably have a more viable waste-free power source than nuclear. Another aspect of uranium mining in Australia and subsequent exportation is; what is the uranium to be used for? - The Government has stated it will not supply to countries which are not signatories to the non proliferation treaty but can treaties not be broken? (E.G. Chamberlain and Hitler over W.W. II) What bitter irony for the uranium being supplied by Australia to be used for war, perhaps even against Australia!

Perhaps some people may say this is doomsday mentality but it is about time we made up our minds how far we want to "progress" if we are to be allowed any debate at all on our future, which at present seems highly unlikely, we must decide the answers to these and many more questions - what's the rush?

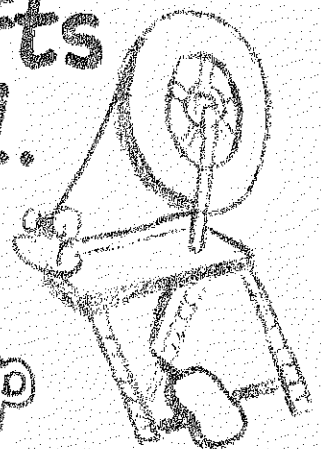

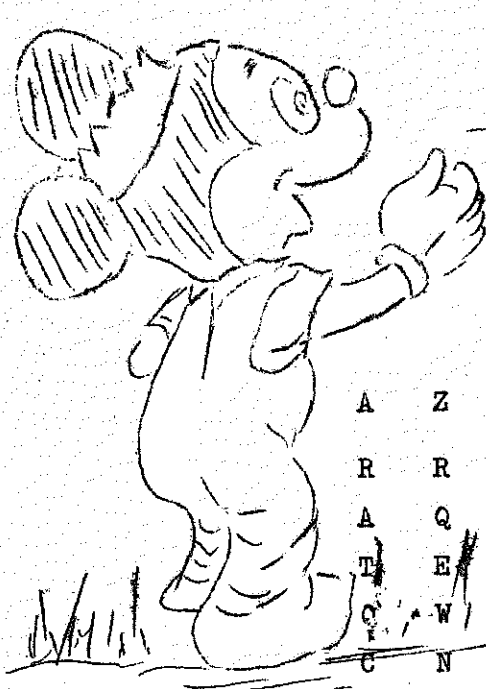
