A TIME AND A PURPOSE

What is Autumn? the mellowing of hot summer days - warm and pleasant; over cast rainy days - a foretaste of winter; chilly mornings and evenings - stimulating and invigorating. 

TO THE EDITOR.

This is a protest against wanton destruction by P.W.D. men - of beautiful wild cherry trees, which, until last week, were growing amongst rocks, on the steep banks of St. Marys Pass. The P.W.D. should get expert advice on native trees and shrubs, before destroying them along country roads - the slashing down of some types of trees and bushes is unnecessary and a waste of money. Wild cherry trees grow upright against hills and do not obscure road vision for motorists. They also have a useful role in holding back natural bush mulch - (sticks, bark leaves) which would otherwise fall on to the road, and a thick layer of mulch assists in causing rain water to soak into the ground rather than gushing down and causing land slips. The St. Marys Pass area is a scenic reserve, and should be treated as such, even by the P.V.D.



I take much pleasure in presenting this the fifth Annual Report of the Fingal Valley Meals on Wheels Association.

It is pleasing to report that during the past I2 months a total of 3,354 meals (to the end of April) have been delivered to recipients by our willing group of volunteers drivers.

The kitchen staff of the hospital, led by Mrs. J. Margison have once again proved very efficient in the preparation of the appertising and eagerly accepted meals. My thanks go to them, and also the Board who allow them to prepare the meals and allow us to use the Hospital for meetings.

A Meals on Wheels organisation would never be able to operate without the provision of "Wheels", and may I take this opportunity to thank the 92 volunteers who so readil y give up their time to deliver a midday meal to the Senior Citizens of the community. May I make particular mention of

the 45 Fingal drivers who regularly travel approx. 30 miles to deliver the meals. We are always on the lookout for more drivers if you know of anyone interested please contact Mr. J. Miller, B. Saunders or myself.

The local group is in a financially sound position with a credit balance of \$788.75 and an investment account balance of \$ 1353.37. The group is affiliated with the Meals on Wheels Association, who are prepared to assist us should we need assistance.

The machinery behind the functioning of the group is the committee of I2 members; Messrs J. Napier, J. Owens, J. Miller, B. Saunders, and L. Rubenach; Mesdames K. Lohrey J. Margison, R. Gill and P. 


