Report on Catholic Church rebuilding meeting;

On Monday night approximately 60 people met in the Memorial Hall to initiate the plans for the rebuilding of a new church building, to replace the building which was destroyed by fire.

The meeting was addressed by the Archbishop of Hobart (Dr. Young) and Father Lloyd of the Church of the Apostles in Launceston. Both speakers emphasised the point of "getting on with the job" with the raising of the necessary finance and the commencement of a building programme. Messrs. G. Shaw M.L.C. and R. Ingamells M.H.A. were present and expressed their sympathy. Rev. Henriks and Pastor Dobson also spoke to the meeting. To expedite plans, two committees were elected; one to make plans for erection of the new building, and the other to plan fund raising functions and look after the financial affairs. Fund raising is to start immediately.

St. Mary's Art Council Branch;

Last Monday 14th April a meeting was held at the request of the Tasmanian Arts Council with a view to forming a branch in St. Mary's. A small but enthusiastic group attended, the meeting was chaired by Councillor Mr. R. Legge and addressed by Mr. David Rossitor of the Tasmanian Arts Council.

After some lively discussion and a review of the various artists and shows due to tour Tasmania through the year, it was decided to form a branch for St. Mary's. The elected officers are President Mr. R. Legge, Sec. Mr. Tim McManus, Treasurer Mr. Ron Sumner and publicity officer John Wassens. Forthcoming shows to be presented by the Arts council are; "Gilbert and Sullivan go Kosh" starring Iain Kerr and Roy Cowen. The Trinidad Steel band are due later this year, a comedy from the Tasmanian theatre company, ballet and opera. All in all it looks like being an excellent series of productions and the Arts Council is hoping for a good response.

Anyone may become a member of the St. Mary's branch of the Arts Council and thereby save on the entrance fee to all shows as well as having preferential booking for seating.

FISHING NEWS

The recent fire which destroyed our local Church, has no doubt been a topic of conversation by the majority of St. Maryians, so it is on the subject of fire and fire fighting, that I propose to deal with in this issue.

Some of our readers will no doubt enquire, as to what this particular subject is doing under this particular heading, if this is so, then let me first point out that fires and fire fighting is of particular interest to the police, and in actual fact, it is part of our duty to enquire into the cause of all fires, where property has been destroyed or where a fire has been supposedly illegally lit during a particular fire danger period, and so on, but I do not propose to dwell on issues, instead I want to come out in the open and have something constructive to say on this subject.

Let me first point out, that my comments which I am about to make, I so do with the interest of all at heart and that I do not intend, that something other than what I have written, should be interpreted from these remarks.

The control of fires is a voluntary effort at St. Marys, but it does seem to me that far too many want to sit back and watch a few individuals do the lot. It's time, I believe, for some fresh thinking and action so that the people of St. Marys can be assured that, in case of fire, that at least something constructive can be done.

At our recent fire at the Church the total strength of the local Fire Unit (1) one very hard working gent, who was not immediately available at the time, neither was the tanker available at the time because there was no vehicle available to tow it with.

The state of our present brigade and equipment leaves a lot to be desired, and it's about time that some regular support came forward to tackle this urgent problem.

That's what I think. What's Your view.

VIETNAM REFUGEES

The plight of the refugees, now running into millions, is well known to us who watch television, but unless the humanitarian agencies receive the much needed funds, conditions will worsen.

I want to start a campaign suggesting to visitors that they take their litter home with them, because no one else wants it. This kind of attitude needs to be inculcated in the young, and if parents know no better I suppose it is left to the schools like so much else. Are children being taught a pride in their heritage these days? It seems that one has to be taught to cultivate an aesthetic appreciation of what is beautiful in itself - surely a very important part of art lessons.

I feel like addressing those unknown and unseen tossers out of unwanted rubbish like this: - 'Look here mates you've enjoyed this bit of Tasmania so why not leave the place pleasant for others!'

We may walk on the grass here (unlike in some parts of Europe), fish, swim, sunbake, take our boats down to the water and float out to the freedom of the sea; we can see the sun quite clearly through clean air, the place smells like the bush or the beach and not like some man-made product. All this is taken for granted here, but already it is disappearing and we are to blame, not the government or some outside enemy. Change your ways while there is something worthwhile left to save.
