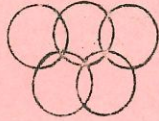

The gala opening ceremony of the Olympic Games arouses in many of us an emotion which is hard to define. As we watch the great event on T.V. we become aware of the transmitted "Oneness". Distance is no barrier, no participation, no separation for universal brotherhood prevails. But the moment soon fades and although the spirit of goodwill may continue each competitor becomes an individual striving to bring honour to his particular country.

Individuality must never be lost in any unity whether it be a small local organisation or a world wide sporting event. This brings to mind a segment of a poem by Helen Lowrie Marsall -
"Dare to be different; life is so full
Of people who follow the same push -
and - pull,
Poor, plodding people who, other than
name,
Try to pretend they're exactly the
same."

On reading a recent article in "Plain Truth" magazine, I became aware of what a dangerous game "follow - the - leader" can be. Not only with regards to human relationships but in the world of agriculture also.

Modern agriculture is bent on supplying greater quantities of food to meet the demands of a rapidly growing population. In particular, new species of high yielding grains have been developed. Impoverished countries are quickly following the example of the developed countries and are discarding many of their original varieties of grains for the new quantity producing kinds. World wide agriculture is depending largely on "genetically uniform crops to supply all of mankind's food." Because of this, pests, disease or drought could attack on a universal basis leaving in their wake famine of indescribable proportions. What may at the moment appear to be abundant production could be reduced disastrously within weeks. It is essential to maintain genetic diversity. For each species is slightly different genetically and therefore has more resistance to such disasters.

Native species are naturally more hardy and resilient to local diseases and climatic conditions than newly introduced varieties. But according to a recent U.N. report, primitive, native varieties are disappearing by the thousand each year.

The well known "Ireland Potato Famine" of the mid 19th century which killed over 2 million people was caused by fungal disease attacking the limited species introduced from South America. This is not an isolated historical case but in fact a global modern day dilemma. For Man's hasty interference could be the start of massive starvation. God gave us intellect to use to the full and also common sense with which to keep things in perspective. We must all resist the temptation of tampering with things until we have sufficient knowledge and stop persuading others to follow our examples and ideas until their worth is proven.

The Olympic Games and agriculture may at first appear to have little in common but the Games should remind us that the ideals of universal brotherhood will one day be reality. And however bleak agriculture may at present appear in the future it will become the basis of our social structure. For the Biblical prophet Micah tells us "They will beat their swords into plowshares and their spears into pruning - hooks.

Everyone will live in peace and prosperity for there will be nothing to fear."

RECIPES

The following hints on "Preserving a Husband" is from an old book:-

Do not stick any sharp instruments into him to see if he is done, but stir gently when necessary. You cannot fail to know when he is tender.

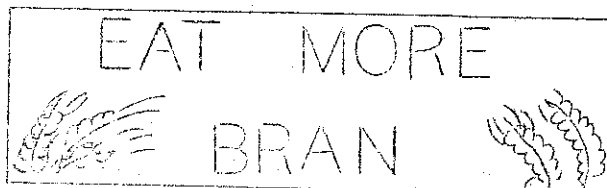
If thus treated, you will find he will be agreeable and last as long as you wish, unless you become careless and set him in a cool place.

SMOKED SALMON PATE

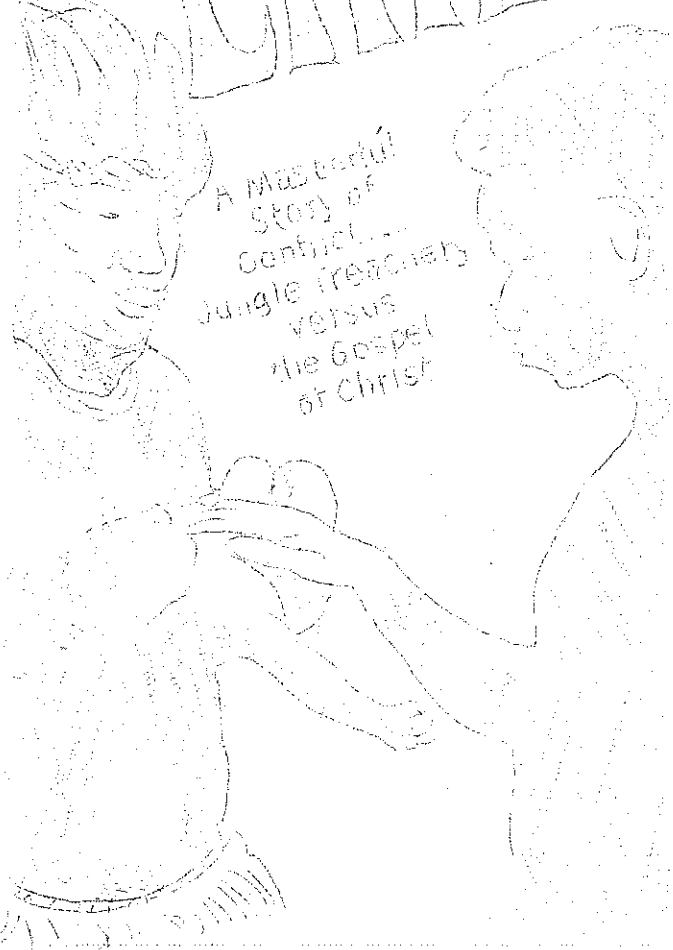
(For the Champagne Breakfast)

Pepper and lemon juice.

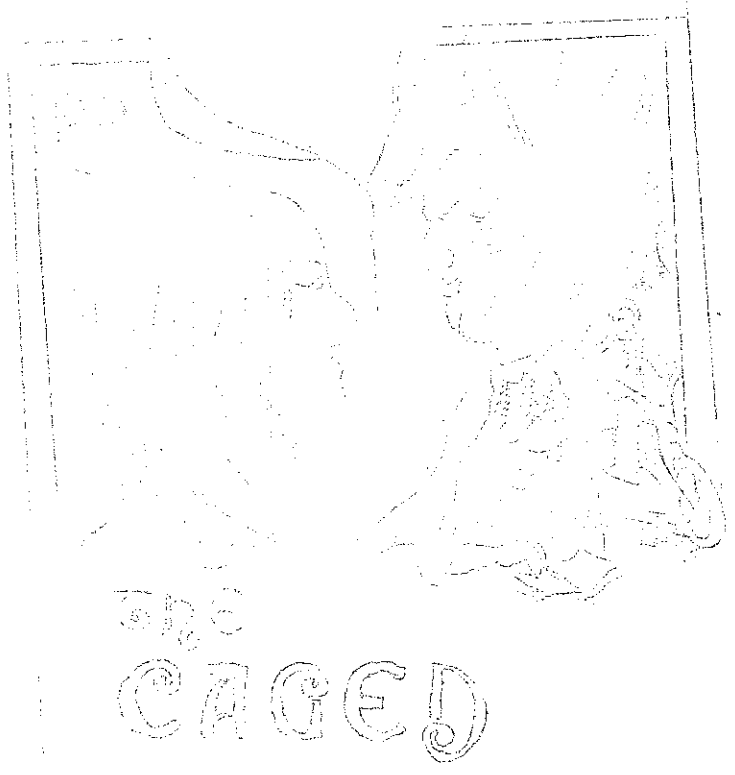
Drain salmon and prawns. Add dash of pepper and squeeze of lemon juice and add cream.

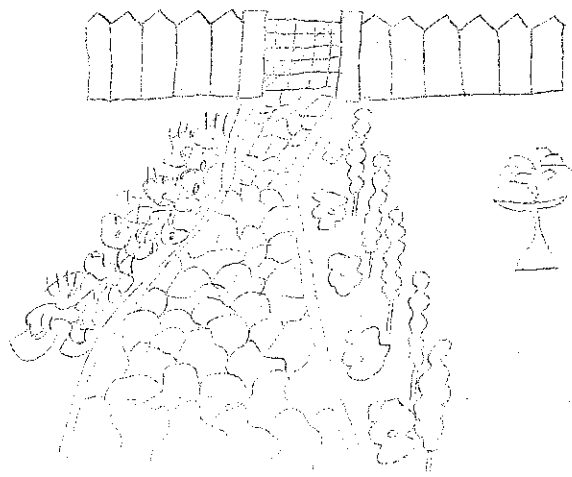

GARDEN NOTES.

If you want to make humus for your potted plants or the strip along the side of the house, have you tried this in a bag? You need a plastic bag that can be tied at the top like a garbage bag or a super bag but this is a little stiff, put all tea leaves peelings, dust from vacuum cleaner, leaves & weeds, crumpled newspapers, in fact anything except plastic tins or glass. Half fill your bag, put about a spade full of dirt in on the rubbish, see that its not too wet (the water doesn't run out) it only wants to be damp, tie the neck of the bag tightly and lay in a sunny corner, turn the bag over about three times a week to mix the contents well and

leave if you have days to do it. At this time of the year humus isn't made so quickly so it would take about till spring to have this lovely humus ready but when the weather warms up a bit the plastic bag warms up too, so the humus is ready much sooner, if you use this in the pots or garden, you will find that the plants have better health and strength.

FISHING NEWS

Headline in a Tasmanian daily paper a few days ago reads "Publicity hits Fish" and we heartily agree. Fish have obviously been reading the papers lately. First, they read that they can be readily caught on the East Coast and this on its own would be enough to make them depart for foreign parts. However, this has been followed by a professional statement that the Tasmanian waters are full of various toxic poisons. No wonder that no catches are being reported. Rumour has it that an appeal has been launched to finance a trip for the professor to investigate the source of pollution in the Dead Sea, this area being as far from Tasmania as possible. A few bream are being caught in the Scamander River if you have enough patience (like going back to your favourite spot for two to three days running), but experienced anglers say that the fish are (a) scarce or (b) not biting. On the bench, the only catch reported was a treble by Geddes Iain at Freshwater Creek (his first) and then one broke off in the shallows. He got no further bites and has not hooked a fish since. Next Sunday, the first event for this season will be conducted by the Scamander Angling Club at Winders from 11 am to 3 pm. St. Helens Game Fishing Club will hold their annual general meeting on Saturday 7th August at the Bay View Hotel and this will be followed by the annual dinner. ANNUAL REPORT FOR YEAR ENDED JUNE 30th 1976. Statement of Receipts & Expenditure for the year ended 17th June 1976.

As President I am pleased to report our branch has functioned very efficiently again this year. Our total membership is 28 and it is only because of their excellent attendance to Red Cross in general that we can offer the service expected from us.

Red Cross Blood Bank has operated successfully but more donors are urgently required in the future. Our thanks to all donors and helpers who attended during visits of Blood Bank.

Annual ambulance appeal was an outstanding success having raised the all time record sum of \$1771.16. This achievement is something our branch, collectors and donors can be very proud of and is greatly appreciated. The response suggests that donors are becoming more aware of the need and service given by our free ambulance. A donation of \$250 was also recieved from the student Council. Jockey Cards were sold and showed a profit of \$515.

The ambulance this year was used on 64 occasions and covered a distance of 8292 miles. The cost of running the service were: garage \$817.86 and driving \$419.18 a total cost per mile of operation \$14.92 cents which compares favourably with \$12.93 cents last year.

Once again our thanks goes to the voluntary ambulance drivers. They are greatly appreciated by our branch and those who have unfortunately to require the service. Without the co-operation of the drivers our branch would find it difficult to continue our free ambulance service. Thanks to our Matron and Staff for their never ending assistance and supply of trained staff to staff our ambulance when required. In closing I would say a vote of thanks to our ex-President Mr. R. Hinds for the great work he did toward keeping the ambulance service running smoothly. I would also like to thank all members and personell associated with our branch for their support during the year.



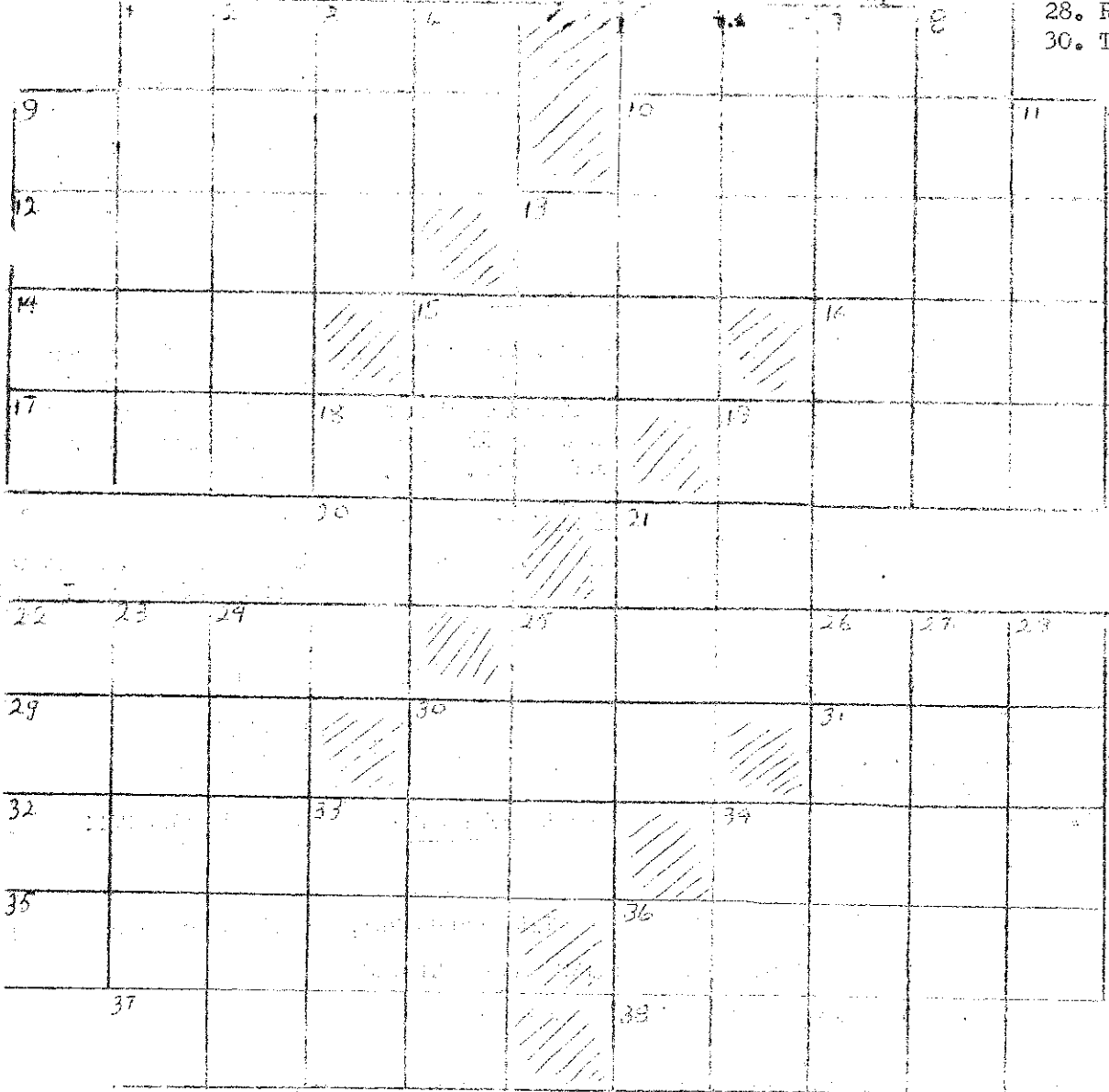
