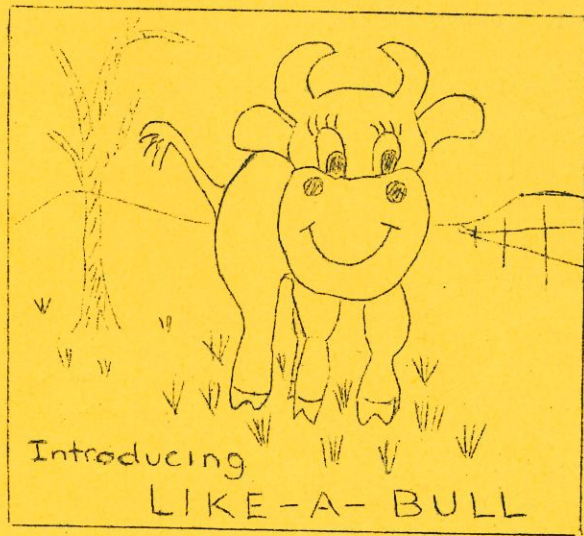



COOKING

Lemon Prune Bread

$\frac{3}{4}$  cup chopped stoned prunes  
1 tbles. lemon juice  
1 tbles. grated lemon rind  
3 cups biscuit mix  
 $1\frac{1}{4}$  cups milk  
1 egg  
 $\frac{3}{4}$  cup chopped walnuts

Heat oven to 350°, grease loaf tin.  
Combine egg, milk and biscuit. Mix,  
beat well, stir in remaining ingredients  
blending well, pour into loaf tin bake  
50 - 55 minutes.

Pumpkin Custard

$1\frac{1}{2}$  cups mashed pumpkin  
 $1\frac{1}{2}$  cups skim milk  
2 eggs  
2 teas. liquid sweetener  
1 teas. vanilla  
1 teas. cinnamon  
 $\frac{1}{2}$  teas all spice  
 $\frac{1}{4}$  teas. salt

Place the cooked pureed pumpkin in a  
large bowl. Combine the skim milk,  
eggs, sweetener, and spices. Mix, add

to the pumpkin blending well. Bake in  
moderate oven 350° for 50 or 60 minutes  
or until firm.

OR

If you want pumpkin tarts bake the  
custard in 6 shallow tart dishes or cus-  
tard cups. Sprinkle the tops with brown  
sugar and spices. About 2 tablespoons of  
sugar and  $\frac{1}{2}$  teaspoon of each spice.

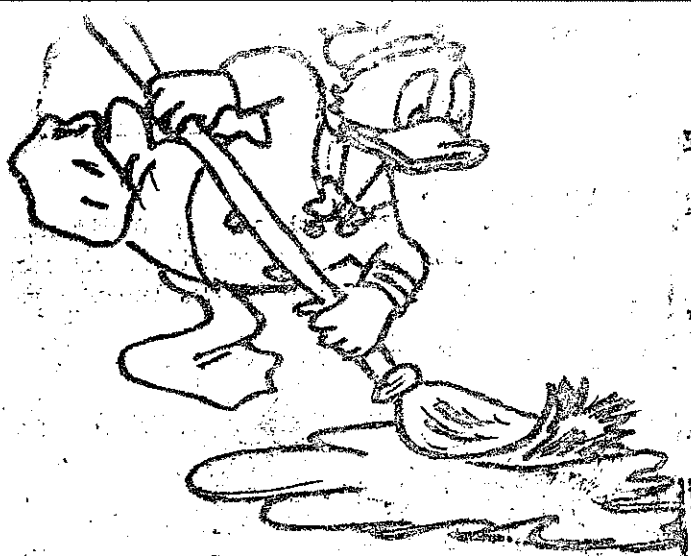
